Dear Fellow Sojourners,

The story of Mary and Joseph suddenly being catapulted into the role of parents to Jesus is a stunning one. We hear a lot about Mary's humility and acceptance, and the qualities of unfathomable and undeniable faith, compassion and love that have caused her to be beloved; a role model for unquestioning Christian faith.

Mary, the mother of Jesus, was going about her life as a young person living in ancient biblical times. She was betrothed to Joseph, a humble carpenter. Her life, as well as humankind's, was instantaneously, irrefutably changed, as we all know, by a visit from the Angel Gabriel. Luke 1:26-38 tells us that Gabriel visited her and announced she was with child, despite her virginity. Mary was to bear the Son of God, Jesus Christ, the King of Kings! Thus, the 'Annunciation.'

Imagine being Mary! Imagine having your whole life suddenly disrupted by this seemingly impossible and, socially unacceptable, situation. Imagine being told she had been specially chosen by God for this purpose. Imagine being young and unmarried, in a patriarchal society where marriage was one's ticket to security; a woman without a husband had no power, and no way to survive. Childbirth out of wedlock would most surely mean severe rejection by her family and friends, and fiancée. She might even be stoned to death or be forced to live her life as a prostitute or beggar to survive.

The Scripture tells us Mary was 'perplexed.' We also know Mary questioned the plausibility of conception, considering she was a virgin, but she did not question anything else. Her perfect humility is exemplary: "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word" (Luke 1:26-56) as she prays "The Magnificat," her praise to God.

We also might wonder about Joseph's situation and the challenges before him, betrothed to a woman who said she was pregnant with the Son of God...who would be born the Messiah! One can only imagine Joseph's reaction to these improbable circumstances! What did he think and feel? How could Mary be pregnant if she was a virgin? Was she losing her mind? Was he angry, disbelieving, hurt, simply shocked or all of the above?

What we do know is that both Mary and Joseph rose to the occasion, despite any doubts or fears they may have had. He assumed his role as husband and protector of Mary and father of her baby; she as compassionate new mother of God's son, Jesus. They completed, in holy partnership, the mission with which they had been charged by God.

Friends, we are all in partnership together in this life, this church community and this world. Let us welcome the Christ Child *in holy partnership*, as did Mary and Joseph. Despite our doubts, fears and wonderings about strangers and each other, let us go forward into the New Year in love, with hope and *in holy partnership*, facing the joys and trials of life, each and every one of us practicing the acceptance and humility of Mary and Joseph: "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."

Let us listen for that word with all our heart, soul and might. I look forward to the future, exploring all the journeys we face together, hearing your questions, your desires, your doubts, fears, joys, sorrows and just plain wondering together at the miracle of our very being, walking this earth together.

- Pastor Nina opened the meeting with a short story. As she read, we were charged to listen for the words "right" and "left". As we heard "right" and "left", an ornament was passed accordingly among the group. It was a fun exercise, and if nothing else, honed our listening skills.
- Investments - the account increased approximately \$71,000 in November. A disbursement of \$6,000 was issued. The end value for November is \$1,864,534.74. One of the mutual funds was sold in anticipation of funds needed to cover December expenses, giving us \$25,000 to work with. Next meeting of the Church Committee is February 13, 2018. All are invited to attend, whether or not you serve on a committee or board.

Campaign update: Thank you for your generosity! We wrapped up our *Living the Giving* campaign this year with a visit from Rochelle Ripley from Hawkwing on Sunday, November 26. While it is incredibly disheartening to hear about the Lakota Indian tribes' suffering, it is also heartwarming to see what Rochelle and all the people who support the Hawkwing program do to help out in so many ways. Pledge cards were collected from our congregation that Sunday. To date, 38 pledges have been received totaling \$42,906. I want to thank each of you who have pledged this year. For those that may have forgotten or otherwise not made a pledge yet, we are in the process of sending out a follow-up letter.

As we mentioned in the last Stewardship moment, even though our campaign is technically now over, the opportunity for giving is never over, as the care of the least of these is never over.

Next year we would like to form a Stewardship group that would meet periodically throughout the year for the 2018 campaign. If anyone would like to be part of this planning, please let Nina or Terry know.


Christmas Tableau

A penguin "parable"

During storms, emperor penguins huddle for warmth, taking turns at the center and on the perimeter of the group. While incubating eggs, up to 6,000 male penguins have been observed clustering for shelter against the harsh Antarctic winter. Partially grown chicks gather in protective "crèches" (French for "cribs"); often surrounded by a colony of adults, these groupings ward off predators and cold.

Music from Around the World - Kamilla Mammedova, Music Director


Starting in January, I'll be introducing a series of world-renowned compositions new to our Congregation written by well-known composers from Azerbaijan.

We will hear excerpts from works of composers of the country who represent the professional, classical music school of the twentieth century, and which connects East and West; where Middle Eastern and Western European musical cultures are combined in the beautiful masterpieces. I'll be introducing a new composer every month.



January is dedicated to the father of the classical professional composition school of Azerbaijan: Uzeyir Hajibeyov. He was the first professional classical composer in the East. His composition list includes: operas, ballets, theatrical comedies, symphonic suites for orchestra, the National Hymn of Azerbaijan and many, many more. His music is a synthesis of folk music and Mugham (a very complex art form which weds classical poetry and musical improvisation, Azerbaijani professional types of singing/composition, along with national instruments) and Western European technique of composition.

Music Committee News


