## From the Pastor's Desk

Fall and the busy Advent season is fast approaching in the church year. I sense that I have many new and interesting church events to witness. I am hearing stories about Heritage Weekend and the Church Fair. I am interested in learning more about the history of the church and the town of South Windsor. I am very appreciative to the people who have made me feel welcome by being my teacher around the local history.

I want to add one more important event to the church calendar. It will be the extended Coffee Hour of <u>Oct. 15, 2023</u>. It is the next step in the transition conversations. Clerk's highlights from the Church Committee meeting held September 12, 2023 -

- Apologies to all who attempted to join us via Zoom. Due to technical difficulties with the internet connection, Zoom was not available.
- Treasurer's report Expenses for August were \$9,671. Income was \$11,674, which includes \$9,000 from Trust principal. Balance on hand is \$2,245. Surplus for the month is \$2,003; deficit year-to-date is \$10.367.
- Investments The account saw a decrease of \$38,489 in August. \$29,489 was a decrease in the portfolio itself; \$9,000 was withdrawn from the Trust principal. Balance at the end of August is \$1,960,487. Jim Belknap mentioned that for the year-to-date, the portfolio has increased in value.
- The next Church Committee meeting will be held on Tuesday, October 10, 2023 at 6:30 pm. It will be held in the Metzger Chapel and on Zoom. All are welcome to attend whether or not you serve on a committee.

## Historian's Column

We have been tracing the name changes that our church has had and why. We have named almost all of the changes. About 60 years from our name change of 1898, the United Church of Christ was formed when three Protestant churches, the Evangelical and Reformed Church, the General

Council of the Congregational Christian Churches and the Afro Christian Convention united on June 25, 1957.

Looking at records of the Connecticut Missions Society (our state conference), we find that they voted to join with the UCC in 1960. In the past, the Congregational Church as a denomination would make changes, but the individual churches could vote to accept or reject those policies. We have churches like ours that agreed to the uniting with the United Congregational Church. Churches like the one in Wethersfield did not. This sent me looking for the exact time when our own church voted to became part of the UCC. I knew where to look, but doing so was not easy.<sup>1</sup>

In the 1961 Church Notes, we find that a special committee was asked to read and bring back a report on the By Laws of the United Church of Christ. When they had completed their assigned task, a special church meeting was called by President Kenneth Nichols for April 30, 1961 following the morning church service for voting by secret ballot to "accept the proposed constitution for the United Church of Christ and thereby become a member of the fellowship." A total of 103 votes were cast, of which 89 voted "yes," 13 voted:" no" and one person left a question mark on the ballot.

The By Laws written after that gives our name as "The First Congregational Church, South Windsor CT United Church of Christ." The name reflects that the church became part of the new denomination (organized 1957) and with that we had another name change. This is our current name. Will there be changes in it in the future? No one knows.

We have been likening the church to a rose, think of the years when the church name had 'Ecclesiastical Society' in it as the era with the old Garden Roses (wild roses and their hybrids): then came the Modern Roses. The Modern Rose is quite a mix with 11 different groups. I don't know the number of protestant denominations. However, Pew Research tells us that, American Protestantism is diverse, encompassing more than a dozen major denominational families – such as Baptists, Methodists, Lutherans and Pentecostals – all with unique beliefs, practices and histories. These denominational families, in turn, are made up of a host of different denominations.

We can use the phrase 'A rose by any other name would smell as sweet' today to indicate that things are what they are, no matter what name you give them.

#### NOTE

<sup>1</sup> To explore the church notes, I needed to go into two loose-leaf binders with rings that were too small for the number of pages in them. I've been reluctant to try to read these minutes. I decided that the only way to read the notes while protecting these pages was to move the contents into a larger binder. What a chore. One notebook has been emptied, with the pages now in page protectors in a larger notebook. This book contains the written records of the Church Meetings for one ten-year period. A few pages moved into a second notebook. Hopefully, by the time you read this, the pages in the second stuffed book will have been transferred.
