






Growing in God's Love

We are grateful to be growing in God's love here at First Church. In 2025, we welcomed four new members:














Silver Lake isn't just a place to me

I remember when my parents first dropped me off at camp and I was super scared to go; I even cried my eyes out. But once I got there, it felt like my whole life had changed in just a week. I thank my parents and the church every single day for sending me to camp. I thank my church for letting me have an amazing opportunity to go and learn about Silver Lake. I couldn't stop talking about camp and I knew that I had to go back again as a camper. I returned to camp in 2023; the conference I attended was called Carry the Torch. I talked to some people who were on staff that summer about their experience on staff. I knew that I always wanted to be on staff at Silver Lake, so when staff applications came out, I applied. I ended up getting hired for the job. I was so excited, I couldn't stop talking about how I was spending two whole months at a place I love. Once I got to camp that summer, I was very nervous that I wasn't going to make any friends. But I told myself that everything happens for a reason and I will be okay. I ended up making many friends for a lifetime that summer and had so much fun. I loved spending my days down by the lake, lifeguarding and even prepping food for meals in the kitchen. I thank God every day for sending me to a place that I absolutely love. I ended up applying for staff 2025 and got the job! When, How and Why Did We Go Away from the Common Cup for Communion?

I would guess that most of you would object to going back to a common cup for communion. I remember that in the 1940's, we had a

common cup for communion at church and at school a water dipper that all students drank from. Around 1948, that school still used a large crock filled each day with freshly drawn well-water, but did away with drinking from the dipper. The reason was the fear of Polio and knowledge that a virus caused the disease. Looking back to the early years of our church, members did not have such fears as that was before the discovery of what causes communicable illnesses.

In the 1860s, Pasteur proved that specific germs caused specific diseases. In 1865, the French military doctor Jean-Antoine Villemin single-handedly demonstrated that consumption (Tuberculosis) could be passed from humans to cattle and from cattle to rabbits. He postulated that a specific microorganism was the cause of the disease, finally laying to rest the centuries-old belief that consumption arose spontaneously in each affected organism. Robert Koch built on Pasteur's work. The work of these scientists led to successful identification of the bacteria causes for anthrax, tuberculosis, and cholera. A cure for tuberculosis did not come until 1944.

When Jesus served the bread and wine at the last supper, He used unleavened bread and a cup of wine. Early communion used a common cup. In the early days of our church, a popular practice was to have all men sit on one side of the meeting house with the women sitting on the other side. A cup was then passed down each side. Eventually, it would be the use of more than one cup that made the adoption of individual cups easier to accept. After all, if you can use more than one, then you can use as many as you might like to use, and that certainly became the case.

On July 17, 1910, our church first served communion with the Individual Communion Service given to the church by Deacon E. A Farnham. The "wine" was served from the two trays that held individual cups. Each tray held forty small glasses similar to those in our large round trays.

Visitors Return to First Church

First Church had a return visit from our friend, Yong Kyupark, from Korea on a recent November Friday afternoon. He surprised us by bringing visitors from Canada. Carrie welcomed them and did her best to answer their questions. They really enjoyed seeing and hearing about the Sewin4Servicemen guilts hanging in the sanctuary, waiting to be blessed before distribution to deserving veterans in our community. Our visitors left with fond memories. photos, some church history packets, and a promise to visit again.









Sewin4Servicemen Lap Quilt Dedication Service

First Church honored our Veterans with a special patriotic quilt dedication service on November 9, 2025. Sewin4Servicemen is a group of dedicated sewers and quilters organized by First Church member Judy Borré. They have been gathering in our church basement for years during the winter, meeting 4 times each year for all-day sewing projects. The patriotic lap quilts are made for and distributed to deserving veterans residing in assisted living and nursing homes in our town and surrounding towns as a special thank you for their service to our country. The quilts are all blessed before being distributed to local veterans. Members of the American Legion Abe E. Miller Post 133 were our special guests. We also recognized all of the volunteer sewers and quilters who make this special project possible.

Trustees News

The Fellowship Hall Floor project is complete. We are in the process of installing curtain rods and rehanging curtains. I don't yet have the final cost, as final payment invoices are still coming in.

We are still working out issues with our new sound system. Some are related to retraining

on the use of mics. We did discover we needed another receiver so that the handheld mic and the Pastor's wearable can be used at the same time. It was installed on 11/14. Music remains an issue as Zoom does not handle music well. Special mics to capture the organ and the choir would be very expensive. We are exploring alternatives to Zoom to see if there is a better option. The video doorbell is again working; we did not need to replace it.

We are working with Kingston Wealth Management to work out the process for requesting funds and developing an investment policy.

We have approved 2 additional work quotes from THI (Tortora Home Improvement):

- 1. Install gutters on the lift housing to prevent water damage to the south wall.
- Install beadboard in place of the wallpaper on the north stairwell from Fellowship Hall to the narthex, as there is a moisture problem that prevents the wallpaper from adhering to the wall.










Candlelight Christmas Eve


