Hístorían's Column

We have diligent researchers learning more about both Timothy and Jonathan Edwards. Occasionally, items found add to what I have observed in our history: lessons from our past about the resilience and attributes of our congregation. We are searching and learning from many sources of the

history of our church organization: the actions, deeds and beliefs of members. Moments in history that have given shape to how we worship: lessons that can guide us as we continue into the future. Just to cite a few from our earlier years appear below.

- In 1694 the Government of the River Colony granted permission to the families east of the river to have their own church. Faith and persistence had carried them through multiple petitions.
- 1703 Jonathan was born. Along with seeing Timothy and Esther educate their daughters, seeing how Jonathan was being educated and Timothy's teaching and tutoring the sons of others as preparation for them to go to Yale had to have strengthened how others saw how education was to be valued.
- 1716 Jonathan entered Yale, deepening feelings of satisfaction or pride in his accomplishment.
- The church hired a music instructor. They accepted and embraced a new form of worship in moving past the lining out of the psalms to singing from hymnals and even eventually buying an organ.
- The advent of the separation of church and state that came from our new United States of America meant that taxes then only funded the government. Our church **survived the change** and found that we **could be self supporting.**

Today, our church will draw on these and other attributes as we move into the future. Discernment of where we are and what we want to be will draw on these and others. It will take persistence and steadfastness in doing the hard work. We can draw on the tenacity of our membership past and present to achieve a firm continuance in determining what we are to become.

As we work to discern where we are going, I believe that we will save some of the practices we have cherished in our present and past

while also embracing new ways of being. Our members are intelligent, industrious and have a high level of education while also being practical. The virtues of persistence and tenacity enable the effort required to do the work of discernment and find our way into the future.

Our diligent researchers are finding the information that will position us in a way to proclaim what the sign on the front of our church claims: that we are the Timothy Edwards Church. We are finding that the lessons of the past are gifts handed down to us.

Studying the past motivates and helps prepare us for the future.



While most people have made a will and signed other legal documents at some point in their lives, there are many kinds of decisions left to be made upon your demise that are not covered in those legal documents. Keeping in mind those that are responsible to deal with what happens next, the purpose of this workshop is to provide a reference guide to help them through this very difficult time. It has been designed to have you consider many questions that will need to be answered if you have not already written them down. The objective is to create a thought provoking and motivating session for

you to reflect upon those important decisions and help you organize them into a reference guide. While it is easy to just "let someone else take care of it", the stress of doing it "right" is putting an unfair burden on that person. If there are multiple decision makers on your behalf, it helps to avoid conflict because these are your stated wishes.

Everyone carries labels they use to define who they are - like, for example, mother/father, artist, caretaker, teacher, athlete, daughter/son, volunteer, leader, etc. So often, however, they do not realize how these labels are given *to* them, how they unconsciously accept and live by them, and how they impact so many aspects of their lives, and not always in bapeficial wave (like by creating facilings of quilt



in beneficial ways (like by creating feelings of guilt or inadequacy).

By beginning to connect with your true self and embracing selfcompassion, self-reflection, self-advocacy, and self-empowerment, you can consciously use labels so that they work for you, instead of limiting yourself or creating negative self-beliefs.

In this workshop, you will have the opportunity to:

- 1. explore the labels you use to describe who you are, what you do, and what you feel you are obligated to do;
- examine how each of these labels comes with defined expectations - those placed on you by others and those you place on yourself;
- reflect on how these expectations impact your well-being; and
- 4. consciously work with labels that align with who you are in a flexible and loving way.
