We are workers, not master builders, ministers, not messiahs. We are prophets of a future not our own.

Oscar A. Romero, Archbishop of San Salvador, in El Salvador, was assassinated on March 24, 1980, while celebrating Mass in a small chapel in a cancer hospital where he lived. He had always been close to his people, preached a prophetic gospel, denouncing the injustice in his country and supporting the development of popular and mass organizations. He became the voice of the Salvadoran people when all other channels of expression had been crushed by the repression. This prayer was composed by Bishop Ken Untener of Saginaw, drafted for a homily by Card. John Dearden in Nov. 1979 for a celebration of departed priests. As a reflection on the anniversary of the martyrdom of Bishop Romero, Bishop Untener included it in a reflection titled "The mystery of the Romero Prayer." –The mystery is that the words of the prayer are attributed to Oscar Romero, but they were never spoken by him." Romero has been beatified as part of the initial process of becoming a saint in the Catholic Church.

Ed. Note: I (Nina) travelled to El Salvador in January, 2013 on a Central American Travel Seminar with Eden Seminary. Learning about the Salvadoran revolution, Archbishop Oscar Romero, his great love for his people and his championing of human rights and the Gospel of Christ was a central part of the journey. Romero became a martyr to the Salvadoran people. Standing in the sacred space of the chapel where he was gunned down was a life-changing experience for me. The grace with which he lived his life and lived out his call is something from which we all can learn. Though not written by him, this prose-poem expresses beautiful sentiments of the work we strive to do as believers on this earth, and offers an encouraging word of hope for the future, "which is not our own," but for which we can plant the seeds. Every March I make it a point to read this and include it in my prayers. In this time of new beginnings with spring on the horizon, I offer it to you for reflection and in memory of the grace of a true servant of God, Archbishop Romero. - Nina

Highlights from February 20, 2018 Church Committee meeting -

- Treasurer - Income for January is \$6,663.03. Expenses are \$15,708.82. Cash on hand is \$2,130.05. Deficit for the month/year-to-date is \$9,045.79. A special gift of \$3,289.29 was received from the Rockwell Trust.
- Investments - the account increased approximately \$49,000 in January. Additions to the fund were a \$10,000 surplus from the Church School, and \$300 for the Robert Burnham fund. No funds were disbursed. The end value for January is \$1,972,609.08.
- The lower hall was given the name of Fellowship Hall.
- Next meeting of the Church Committee is March 13, 2018. All are invited to attend, whether or not you serve on a committee or board.

We started off the year with our 320th Annual meeting on January 28, 2018. It was attended by 30 members. Some of the highlights are as follows:

- Currently looking for a new Sexton. Amanda McNulty submitted her resignation in January.
- A question about the Membership Roster included in the Annual Report was brought forward. A discussion was held and was tabled for further discussion
- All committee reports, the new budget and nominating report were agreed upon, updates noted and accepted.
- We are still looking for people to join the Diaconate. There is a big concern that 5 out of the 6 Deacons who served in 2017 (and agreed to stay on for one more year) will have their terms expire the end of this year. On the positive side, there were two people at the annual meeting who agreed to join this year.
- A Bylaw review group of two people will be formed for the purpose of reviewing the current Bylaws and providing recommendations for any changes. Jean Trotman had previously asked the head of each committee to complete a form outlining what their current committee does and doesn't do today relative to our current Bylaws and provide suggestions for making any changes. The form is due back by end of February.

I would like to thank Jean Trotman for being an excellent Moderator for the past two years. I am looking forward to serving as the next Moderator and only hope I can be as diligent as Jean.

Frank Roswell Fuller was born in Hartford on August 23, 1873, and attended local public schools. He went to New York City at the turn of the century and commenced a long and successful career in the brokerage business. Mr. Fuller was always interested in helping "needy, deserving" students obtain the education that he had not been able to enjoy himself.



Interested candidates should complete the application and submit it to the Frank Roswell Fuller Scholarship Fund at Trinity College by **May 15, 2018**. Eligibility Requirements In order to meet the eligibility requirements for a Fuller Scholarship you must be:

1. Able to demonstrate financial need (determined by filing the FAFSA)
2. Currently in your senior year at a high school located within Hartford County
3. Maintaining an average of 70 or better (or its equivalent)
4. A member of the UCC/Congregational Church and "professed to be of the Congregational faith"
5. Planning to attend a fully accredited four-year college as a candidate for a baccalaureate degree

Kamilla's Kolumn *Composer of the Month - February*

It is my pleasure to continue to introduce composers of the Azerbaijani music school. This month is dedicated to Gara Garayev - another giant composer who became one of the most talented and innovative representatives of twentieth century composers, along with being a philosopher and groundbreaker of the school of classical composition.

Gara Garayev was born in Baku, Azerbaijan. Close friend and student of Dmitri Shostakovich, he was the first "Soviet composer" who gained international acclaim during the "Soviet Cold War Era." Garayev was a graduate of the Moscow Conservatory.

During the Cold War in June 1961, Garayev and Russian composer Khrennikov, were the only two Soviet composers who attended the first International Los Angeles Music Festival held at UCLA. Fifteen composers from seven nations presented their works there, among them Schoenberg and Stravinsky. On June 11, F. Waxman, twelve-time Academy Award nominee,

conducted the Festival Symphony Orchestra with a suite from Garayev's "Path of Thunder."

Garayev emerged as a groundbreaking composer of twentieth - century modern music, whose works made an appearance in the main concert halls of the world.

His work is a beautiful combination of Azerbaijan music along with modern twentieth century harmony and tonal language, innovative symphonic orchestration, melody and harmony, beautifully combined. His musical descriptions of human emotions, tragedy and drama, love and struggle, sometimes using humor, jazz, tragedy and sorrow, create truly dramatic and superior masterworks of the twentieth century.

Garayev's list of compositions include-symphonies, symphonic suites, ballets, 24 preludes for piano, a number of piano miniatures and pieces, sonata for violin and piano, chamber pieces including songs and romances, music for movies and many, many more.



Composer of the Month - March

Hello! I will be introducing the music of F. Amirov, A. Azizov and N. Aliverdibeyov in the coming months, all Azerbaijani composers of the 20th century.



This month, we shall learn about the life of Fikret Amirov. Fikret Amirov grew up in an atmosphere of Azerbaijan folk music. His father, Mashadi Amirov, was a famous mugam singer ("*xanəndə*") from the ancient Azerbaijan town, Shusha. Mashadi played an Azerbaijani instrument - the tar.

During his childhood and early adolescence, Fikret began composing pieces for the piano. Amirov graduated from the Azerbaijan State Conservatoire, now known as the Baku Music Academy, where he was a student of Uzeyir Hajibeyov.

Amirov's music was strongly influenced by Azeri folk melodies. He created a new genre called symphonic mugam. Amirov's symphonic mugams were based on classical folk pieces and

were performed by many renowned symphony orchestras throughout the world, such as the Houston Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Leopold Stokowski.

Amirov was a prolific composer. Some of his most famous pieces include symphonic works such as "Shur," (1946), "Kurd," "Ovshari" (1949), "Azerbaijan Capriccio" (1961), "Gulustan Bayati-Shiraz" (1968), "The Legend of Nasimi" (1977), "To the Memory of the Heroes of the Great National War" (1944), and "Double Concerto for Violin, Piano and Orchestra" (1948).

His ballets include "Nizami" (1947) and "Arabian Nights," which premiered in 1979. Amirov wrote the opera "Sevil" in 1953.

He also wrote a number of pieces for the piano including "Ballad," "Ashug's Song," "Nocturne," "Humoreska," "Lyrical Dance," "Waltz," "Lullaby" and "Toccata." He also wrote numerous film scores.

Michelle Kwan, World Champion Ice Skater from the U.S. used Fikret Amirov's symphonic piece "Gulustan Bayati-Shiraz" in her skating program "Taj Mahal" in 1996.

Our Fourth Meeting House: Part 1

The third meetinghouse was used for 85 years. It was razed in 1845. It was taken down and the new meetinghouse was completed in 1846. Some of the material saved from that building was used in this building.

The new building was located in nearly the same spot as the third one. Barney Daley in his book,

Tobacco Parish, says that the third meetinghouse was located where the Wolcott Chapel now stands.

During the time the third meetinghouse was being dismantled and the fourth one was finished, the congregation met at the Baptist Church that was at 819 Main Street.

Originally the building did not have a basement. There was a dug out area that housed a coal furnace. Joe Vibert described early memories of the area to then pastor, Art Dunham, as being dark and having cobwebs. There was a coal chute in the area that now houses our lift.

There was a covered outside entrance with stairs to the basement at that same area. Years later the basement was added. The back wall of the building

was at the edge of the carpeted area of the basement. The kitchen had a window above the sink. It was where the custodian's closet is now with a window that faced the south. The bathrooms were near the middle along that wall. Interior access from the second floor was the stairway from the Narthex.

Our beautiful stained glass windows were added in 1903 on the 200th anniversary of the birth of Jonathan Edwards, son of our first pastor, Timothy Edwards. They cost \$300.00 per window. The stained glass in them is called cathedral or opalescent glass; the surface is coated with an ultra-thin layer of metallic salts during manufacturing to produce a shimmering finish.

During a church meeting in response to the question of should young church members have a say and vote in the business of the church, Joe Vibert told of a time when he was young that he spoke at a church meeting. The minister that was pastor at that time wanted to remove the stained glass windows and sell them. Back then Joe spoke about his desire to keep the windows. He recounted this to support his assertion that if our young people were mature enough to join the church, they should be given the same privileges as other members.

There are no windows or doorways in the wall behind the pulpit. I do not know about the back wall on the lower level. If you should have any knowledge, please let us know. I will continue on with the story of this building next month.
